Graduation Plan

Foundation plan with an endorsement (area of interest)

- 4 English credits
- 4 Math credits
- 4 Science credits
- 3 4 History credits (depends on endorsement)
- 2 Foreign Language credits (must be the same language)
- 1 PE/Athletic credit
- 1 Fine Art credit
- + Elective credits

Total of 26 credits

Pass all 5 EOC tests: ENG 1, ALG, BIO, ENG 2, and USH

Attendance is required to earn credit

- "90% Rule" is law
- A student must be in attendance for each period 90% of the time the course is offered within a semester
- If a student exceeds unexcused absences, credit will be <u>denied</u> regardless of grade and a zero will be calculated into the student's GPA.
- It is critical that students turn in notes promptly to the office
- Example: Semester 1 has 84 days
 - A student may only miss 10% = 8 school days
 - Student passes a class with a grade of 75, the credit is denied if more than 8 absences
 - The student <u>must</u> makeup the hours owed or will have to <u>re-take</u> the course

Plans after high school

- What are the student's interests or goals?
 - Options: ASVAB, Collegeboard, interest inventories, etc.
- There are many different pathways
 - Military, Technical/Training school, Community College, University, or workforce?
 - Each of these have different requirements
- Military ASVAB
- Technical/Training school or Community College TSI
- University SAT/ACT
- Workforce Training

College or Military Visits

- Junior & Senior students are allowed two (2) school days per year to visit college campuses or military offices. Days that are not used within the year do not roll over.
- A college/military visit form can be requested from the office.
- The visit form will need to be signed by the teachers and parent and kept on file.
- For the visit to be an <u>excused absence</u>, the student <u>must turn in a</u>
 <u>note</u> to the attendance office. The note must be on <u>official</u>
 <u>letterhead</u> showing the day of the visit and signed by a
 college/military representative.

Official campus visit

- Meet with an Admissions Counselor
- Verify Admission requirements
- Determine actual college costs
- Ask about financial aid opportunities
- Take a campus tour
- Investigate the academic programs
- Attend a class
- Talk with students and faculty
- Discuss your chances for success:
 - admission
 - graduation
 - placement

Applying for admissions - *Observe deadlines**

Narrow your choices, review entrance test requirements, and submit application materials.

Complete Application for admission (www.applytexas.org)

Application fees – Waivers may be available if you qualify.

Supplements (counselor/teacher)

High school transcript – Request through the counselor's office

SAT/ACT test results – Students must submit scores through testing site

Recommendations – Give plenty of advance time and information about

yourself.

Applying for the FAFSA - during Senior year

- You can apply starting in October
- LHS will offer sessions for help with the FAFSA in the fall
- Financial aid can include: scholarships, grants, loans& work study
- Start early to understand the process

Top 10% Rule

To be eligible for automatic admission, a student **must**:

- •Graduate in the **top 10 percent** of his or her class; **Except** for UT Austin Top **6%**.
- •On the Foundation Plan, graduate with a Distinguished Level of Achievement (includes 4 science & 4 math-including ALG 2)
- •Enroll in college no more than two years after graduating from high school; Submit an application to a Texas public university for admission before the institution's application deadline
- •Students are required to provide SAT or ACT scores. Students must also take the TSI test, unless exempted from the TSI test requirement.
- •Admission to a university does not guarantee acceptance into a particular college of study or department, however.

TSI Assessment

- Subject areas include: Reading, Writing, and Math
- Required for Technical/Training School, and Community Colleges
- Required for dual credit college courses
- Basic assessment of skills to indicate "college ready"
- Available at many locations
 - Tarleton State University
 - Ranger College
 - Weatherford College Granbury or Weatherford
 - At LHS in the spring
